

Human Wildlife Solutions Overstrand Monthly Report March 2024

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 March to 31 March 2024.

The Voëlklip Troop continued to use the western portion of their home range, moving almost as far west as the Hemel-en-Aarde Road west of Patryskloof. The new male, VKM6U, was observed frequently around the Voëlklip Troop. The continuous presence of VKM6U led to prolonged confrontation with the resident alpha male, UNKM1, whereby they engaged in many chases and inter-male fights. As part of this conflict, it is suspected that VKM6U engaged in infanticide; a deceased infant was observed being carried by its mother on 13 March. Whilst the troop spent the majority of its time beyond the urban edge, three troop members did manage to access town very briefly on one occasion during the month.

There is little to be said concerning both the Vogelgat and Hamilton-Russell Troops. Both of these troops were entirely absent from town during March. The Vogelgat Troop did exhibit a contracted foraging range during March, with the troop heavily utilizing the mountain side directly above the Hermanus Yacht Club.

The Onrus Troop was again seen in close proximity to the urban edge on several occasions during March, and in particular around the Glen Fruin Meadows Estate. On a positive note, whilst the troop continued to use the area around the pig farm extensively during the month, members from the troop were able to enter very briefly on only one occasion, thanks to the efforts of rangers tasked with monitoring the troop. Part of this success is attributable to the use of the virtual fence which was successfully used to deter both the Onrus and Voëlklip Troops from entering town on several occasions.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

- Troop time out of town remained at 100% during March.
- Time out of town for individuals decreased from 100% during February to 99.8% in March.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Individuals from the Voëlklip Troop were present in town and spent approximately 45
 minutes in the urban area on the evening of 23 March. No bin raids or house incursions
 were recorded during this brief period in town.
- The Voëlklip Troop used the sleep site above Erica Close intensively this month. While based here, the troop foraged primarily in the western portion of its home range.
- UNKM1 and VKM6U were observed in frequent confrontations over the course of the month.
 VKM6U spent most of the month closely shadowing the troop, often interacting with VKF5 and another unidentified female. Several copulation events between VKM6U and the latter female were noted.
- On 7 March, VKM6U was observed attempting to snatch and kill an infant from one of the adult females. Over the course of the month several observations of attempted infanticide by VKM6U were made. This was likely the cause of death of a dead infant seen being carried by its mother on 13 March.
- VKM6U was absent from the Voëlklip Troop from 24 March until 30 March. It is unclear where VKM6U was during this absence.
- On 1 March a large troop of at least 40 individuals was seen above Newton-Johnson Vineyards. It is suspected that this was the Mountain Rose Troop.




Figure 1. Map showing the movements of the Voëlklip Troop in March 2024 based on the GPS collar fitted to UNKM1.




Figure 3. The Voëlklip Troop Incursion Summary graph for March 2024.




Figure 4. The Voëlklip Troop Time out of Town Summary graph for March 2024.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- No members of the Vogelgat Troop entered the urban area during March.
- The Vogelgat Waterfall Troop was observed foraging very close to the Vogelgat Troop on 4 March near Lagoon Edge.
- The Vogelgat Waterfall Troop was seen on three days during March.

ONRUS TROOP

- The Onrus Troop was observed on 27 Days during February.
- On 5 March a hotline call reported the troop was in the vicinity of Southern Right Wines, to the east of the Hemel-en-Aarde Road.
- Members of the Onrus Troop were seen around Glen Fruin Meadow Estate towards the end of the month. Three reports of baboon activity were received from this area. One hotline report informed HWS that the baboons were seen foraging on fruiting olive trees in the area before moving back towards the mountains.

• As with the previous few months, the ranging activity of the Onrus Troop was centered around the pig farm. The troop was observed in the vicinity of the pig farm on 21 days. Despite the large amount of time the troop spent in the region of the pig farm, only one member of the troop (a sub-adult male) was seen accessing food on the farm for eight minutes on one day during the month.

HAMILTON RUSSELL

- The Hamilton Russell Troop was observed on nineteen days during the month.
- The Hamilton Russell Troop was most often seen between the De Bos Dam and La Vierge Winery. The troop foraged extensively in the De Bos Dam Valley.

VIRTUAL FENCE

• The virtual fence was used on five days during March. Three activations were used to deter the Voëlklip Troop whereas two were used for the Onrus Troop.

GENERAL COMMENTS

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

No births were recorded in managed troops in the Overstrand East during March. Additionally, no migration activity was noted during the month. One death was recorded in the Voëlklip Troop; a deceased infant was observed being carried by its mother on 13 March. The cause of death was most likely infanticide by VKM6U.

HOTLINE DATA

A total of fourteen hotline calls were received during March (**Table 5**). Eight calls originated in managed areas, the majority of which (6) were made concerning the location or activity of baboons beyond the urban edge. Six calls were received from unmanaged areas, namely Cape Town, Pringle Bay, Betty's Bay, and Rooiels.

RECORDED INCURSIONS

Individuals from the Voëlklip Troop were present in town on one day during the month. Three individuals, including UNKM1, were in town for approximately 45 minutes. During this time no incursions were recorded.

PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN

The average time out of town by troops in the eastern Overstrand during March remained at 100%. Individual time out of town decreased very slightly due to the presence in town of three members of the Voëlklip Troop for 45 minutes. As result individual time out of town decreased to 99.95%.




Figure 7. Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during March 2024.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritized to take place in the early mornings and starting on the edge of town and working inwards.
- Residents should **not** put out their waste **the night before** collection day because this may encourage baboons to raid that evening or early the next morning.
- **Refuse bags** should never be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be baboon-proof and locked.
- Open vegetable gardens should be baboon proofed.
- Ripening fruits should be removed from fruiting trees.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds. Bird seed is a powerful attractant for baboons.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).
- Dogs should always be on a leash when walking in an area where baboons may be present. This is mandatory in the Fernkloof Nature Reserve.

CONCLUSION

Despite the brief time spent in town by three members of the Voëlklip Troop, baboon management maintained very positive results for all managed troops in the Overstrand East during March. The number of hotline calls was slightly higher compared to February, however, the majority of these calls referred to baboon activity beyond the urban edge.

The reduction in the amount of time spent at the pig farm by members of the Onrus Troop was also very positive. Reducing the reliance of the troop on this food source improves the welfare of the troop by reducing the risk of disease and injury associated with the farm. Similarly, not having baboons visit the pig farm will also improve the welfare of the pigs.

The presence of VKM6U around the Voëlklip Troop has had some negative effects, the most obvious being the case of suspected infanticide, a type of behavior that is common when immigrant males attempt to integrate into a new troop (Zipple *et al.*, 2017). This is likely to have significant effects on the level of stress felt within the troop, specifically in female baboons (Engh *et al.*, 2006). As a result of this elevated level of stress within the troop the potential exists for the troop to make more attempts to enter town in search of nutrient dense human derived foodstuffs (HDF's). It is important that this behaviour not be allowed to return.
