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# **INTRODUCTION**

This monthly report covers the period from 1 May to 31 May 2024.

During May the Voëlklip Troop spent most of its time near Rotary Way, foraging in the area to the south and east of Hamilton-Russel Vineyards. This continued the movement trend observed during the previous month. Despite the intense utilization of sleep sites above Hermanus Heights, members of the Voëlklip Troop only managed to access town for very brief periods over the course of five days during May. No assertive behaviour was recorded, and individuals spent on average 23 minutes in town when they did manage to enter.

One highly significant event that took place in May was the death of VGF2, the collared adult female in the Vogelgat Troop. VGF2 was found on 5 May on a property above the R43. The cause of death is unknown, with no external indications as to what killed VGF2. This death created a major setback for the management of the troop because HWS field staff can no longer monitor the movements of the troop remotely just by logging in on their mobile devices. Instead, the field rangers have to rely on locating the baboons either visually, or by listening for their calls. As such, the ability of field staff to preempt troop movements towards town has been significantly reduced.

The Onrus Troop displayed a slight decline in its raiding behaviour during May. Some members from the troop were reported in town briefly on one day during the month, and one non-urban occupied house raid by ONM2 and an adult female was recorded. Despite this, the troop remained out of town for the whole month and the new collar fitted to ONM2 allowed field staff to preempt several other attempts that the troop made to enter town.

# **OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS**

# **VOËLKLIP TROOP**

### IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town remained at 100% during May.
- Time out of town for individuals decreased from 99.8% during April to 99.4% in May.

### **NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS**

- Several individuals from the Voëlklip Troop, namely VKF5 (red tagged female) and unidentified sub-adult males and females, were present in town on five days during the month. In total, they spent approximately 1 hour and 57 minutes in town. No assertive behaviour (threatening behaviour or house incursions) was recorded.
- At 09h21 a hotline text reported a baboon in town, near 20 Fernkloof Drive. By 09h35 there was still no sign of the individual in town. At 09h46 VKF5 was seen moving towards the troop from the paragliders launch off site on the cliffs overlooking Hermanus Heights.
- UNKM1 and VK6U continued to fight through out the month, often spending prolonged periods away from the troop during these bouts of conflict. UNKM1 continued to be successful in preventing VKM6U from joining the troop fully. VKM6U spent the majority of his time slightly apart from the troop, but often associated with VKF5 or other females.
- On 7 May UNKM1 was seen with blood on his shoulder, likely due to conflict with VKM6U. Similarly, VKM6U was observed limping on May 8. Both injuries appeared to have been minor because both individuals recovered quickly.
- The Voëlkip Troop utilised the western portion of its home range extensively during the month
  and rarely headed north past Hamilton-Russel Vineyards or east into Fernkloof Nature reserve
  (Figure 1). Sleeping activity was concentrated at sleep sites on the cliffs above Hermanus Heights.




Figure 3. The Voëlklip Troop Incursion summary graph for May 2024.




Figure 4. The Voëlklip Troop Time out of Town summary graph for May 2024.

### **VOGELGAT TROOP**

#### NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- On May 3 the collar fitted to VGF2 indicated that VGF2 had hardly moved during the course of the
  day. This inactivity prompted a search on May 4 to determine the status of VGF2 and the collar.
  On 5 May VGF2 was found deceased on a property on the northern side of the R43. The cause of
  death is uncertain, because there were no external indications on the body of VGF2. The female's
  body was sent for an autopsy and tested for toxins, but no evidence of snake bite or poisoning
  were obtained.
- On 7 May a hotline report was received informing HWS about a dead baboon on the R43 east of Hermanus. No location was provided in the report. After searching the stretch of R43 from Hermanus to the edge of Stanford, no body was found. It is likely that this report concerned an individual frrom an unmanaged troop residing east of the Vogelat Troop.
- No members of the Vogelgat Troop were observed entering the urban area during May. One hotline
  call was received on 8 May reporting baboons near the OK supermarket in Voëlklip. Field staff
  searched the area but did not detect any baboons.
- The troop spent the majority of the month foraging in the vicinity of Stillwaters Farm and the Hermanus Yacht Club. Unfortunately, due to the loss of VGF2 and her radio collar, HWS was unable to determine the full foraging area of the troop during May.

# **ONRUS TROOP**

### **NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS**

- The Onrus Troop foraged in a fairly small area during May, utilising the mountains above Onrusrivier North and Glenfruin Meadows, and extending inland to the valleys above the Camphill Road Pig Farm. The troop appeared to have utilised only three sleep sites during the month.
- On 11 May, a hotline call reported several male baboons moving down from Owl Rock to Glen Street. When HWS field staff arrived in the area the troop was spotted on the mountain above Owl Rock Road. The virtual fence was activated in the evening to prevent the troop from descending the mountain again.
- On 14 May a hotline call was received reporting an out of town occupied house raid by an adult male baboon wearing a collar (ONM2). ONM2 was accompanied by a female baboon. The house in question was on the Southern Right Farm. The troop was steered away from the farm when HWS field staff arrived.

# **HAMILTON RUSSELL**

- The Hamilton Russell Troop was observed on 23 days during May.
- The Hamilton Russell Troop spent a significant time foraging between Volmoed Valley and Camphill Farm.

# **VIRTUAL FENCE**

• The virtual fence was used on three days during May.

 All activations were used to deter the Onrus Troop from entering town near the Leopard Rock sleep site. The first activation was on the evening of 11 May; the second was on the morning of the 20 May; and the last activation was in the morning of 25 May.

# **GENERAL COMMENTS**

### **POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS**

No births were recorded in the managed troops in the Overstrand East during May. Additionally, no migration activity was noted during the month. One death was recorded. VGF2 was found deceased on 5 May. The cause of death was unknown.

### **HOTLINE DATA**

A total of 13 hotline calls were received during May. Nine calls were received from managed areas, with four calls made concerning baboon incursion behaviour (**Table 5**). Three calls were received concerning the Onrus Troop, one reporting the presence of baboons in the urban area and two reporting non-urban baboon activity on the Southern Right Farm (including one occupied house raid). Five calls were received from the Hermanus Heights area. Two of these calls reported the presence of baboons in the urban area, with three calls reporting baboon vocalizations on the mountains above the suburb. Lastly, one hotline call was received from Voëlklip reporting the presence of baboons in the vicinity of the OK supermarket. Three calls were received from unmanaged areas, all three concerning baboons in Pringle Bay.

# **RECORDED INCURSIONS**

A total of six incursions were recorded during May. The majority of the incursions were attributed to the Voëlklip Troop (five), with one incursion by a member of the Onrus Troop. No assertive incursion behaviour was recorded during the month. All incursion behaviour was classed as being "in the urban area".

# PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN

The average time spent out of town by troops in the eastern Overstrand during May did not change, staying at 100%. Individual time out of town remained at 99.99% despite a slight increase in the amount of time spent in town by members of the Voëlklip Troop (15 minutes during April to 1 hour and 57 minutes in May). It is important to note that any time spent in town can only be calculated if members of the HWS field team observe baboons in the urban area.




Figure 8. Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during May 2024.

# **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritized to take place in the early mornings and starting on the edge of town and working inwards.
- Residents should **not** put out their waste **the night before** collection day because this may encourage baboons to raid that evening or early the next morning.
- Refuse bags should never be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be baboon-proof and locked.
- Open vegetable gardens should be baboon proofed.
- Ripening fruits should be removed from fruiting trees.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds. Bird seed is a powerful attractant for baboons.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).
- Dogs should always be on a leash when walking in an area where baboons may be present. This is mandatory in the Fernkloof Nature Reserve.

# **CONCLUSION**

The behaviour of managed baboons in the Overstrand during May was generally positive, with time out of town for individuals and troops above 99.9%. There was a slight increase in the amount of time spent in town by members of the Voëlklip Troop, with individuals having spent 1 hour and 57 minutes in town over the month. Despite this, no assertive behaviour was recorded for any troop within the urban area during the month. One non-urban occupied house raid, committed by ONM2 at a cottage on Southern Right Farm, was recorded. This behaviour is concerning and needs to be actively discouraged to prevent it from becoming a habit within the troop. However, assertive behaviour beyond the urban edge is difficult to manage given the size of the area and complexities regarding access to private land.

The death of VGF2, and the subsequent loss of a collar to monitor the Vogelgat Troop, is the most significant incident to have occurred during May. The cause of VGF2's death is not known. No external injuries were evident and the results of a post-mortem examination did not indicate that the baboon had suffered from poisoning or snake bite. The loss of VGF2's collar will appreciably impact the ability of field staff to monitor the movement behaviour of the Vogelgat Troop and hence the preemptive the use of the Virtual Fence system. Recollaring an individual in the Vogelgat Troop should be considered a high priority in order to facilitate effective management of the troop with the Virtual Fence.
