

Human Wildlife Solutions Overstrand Monthly Report October 2024

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INTRODUCTION

This monthly report covers the period from 1 October to 31 October 2024.

Members of the Voëlklip Troop were present in town on eight days during the month, with the most frequent visitors to town being VKM7 and VKF5. The increased presence of members of the Voëlklip Troop in the urban area may be due to conflict between the Mountain Rose and Voëlklip Troops. The reappearance of the Mountain Rose Troop has caused the Voëlklip troop to forage closer to town, in the Adderladder and Mossel River Valleys as opposed to the Mountain Rose Valley. It is assumed that this is in order to avoid interacting with the Mountain Rose Troop which is a much larger troop with numerous males. Males from these troops were observed fighting and chasing each other on several occasions during October.

The Onrus Troop was seen again for the first time since 20 September. It was absent from town for the entirety of October, and was most frequently seen in the vicinity of the Camphill Road pig farm. Similarly, the Hamilton Russel Troops was completely absent from any urban areas and was only directly observed on one day during the month.

The Vogelgat Troop spent the month foraging on the mountain slopes above the R43, predominantly in the area around Stillwaters. There was however a lone male, identified to be from the Vogelgat Troop, that was observed in town frequently during October. Spending approximately 19 hours in town, this male was responsible for one unoccupied house incursion. He was last seen in town on 19 October and was seen again with the Vogelgat Troop on 25 of October. In response to frequent sighting of this male baboon in town, concerned residents of Fernkloof reported their concerns to HWS via the baboon hotline. It is likely that this male is in the process of dispersing from his natal troop, which puts him at increased risk of entering the urban area alone.

OVERSTRAND EAST TROOPS

VOËLKLIP TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Troop time out of town remained at 100% during October.
- Time out of town for individuals decreased from 99.2% in September to 94.7% in October.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- Individuals from the Voëlklip Troop were present in town on eight days during the month, six more than during September.
- During the time spent in town by individuals of the Voelklip Troop, there were eight instances of bin raiding and two house incursions (one occupied and one unoccupied incursion).
- VKM7 was responsible for the majority of the incursions (n = 13), including both house incursions and one incident of threatening behaviour.
- The recent erratic behaviour of the Voelklip Troop is suspected to be the result of conflict with the
 Mountain Rose Troop, in particular between the males of both troops. The first recorded incident
 of conflict between the two troops males was on 14 October. The conflict has led the Voelklip
 Troop to preferrentially forage in the Adderladder and Mossel River Valleys, closer to town, rather
 than in the Mountain Rose area.




Figure 2. The Voëlklip Troop Incursion summary graph for October 2024.




Figure 3. The Voëlklip Troop Time out of Town summary graph for October 2024.

VOGELGAT TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Time out of Town for the troop remained at 100% during October.
- Time out of Town for individuals decreased from 99.6% during September to 95.1% during October.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- The Vogelgat Troop was absent from town for the entirety of the month, foraging extensively in the core area of their homerange, near the stillwaters and Maanskynsbaai sleep sites north of the R43.
- On 2 October, a hotline report was received concerning a lone male in the Voelklip area,. At that
 time the Vogelgat Troop was foraging in the vicinity of the Maanskynsbaai Waterfall. This male
 continued to enter the urban area frequently during the month, until 19 October. He was observed
 again with the troop on 25 October, during which time he fought with another adult male in the
 troop.
- This male was responsible for one unoccupied house incursion, however he was repeatedly reported by residents on the baboon hotline.




Figure 4. The Vogelgat Troop Incursion summary graph for October 2024.




Figure 5. The Vogelgat Troop Time out of Town summary graph for October 2024.

ONRUS TROOP

IN TOWN STATISTICS

- Time out of Town for the troop remained at 100% during October.
- Time out of Town for individuals remained at 100% during October.

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

- The Onrus Troop was entirely absent from the urban area for the whole month.
- Troop was seen on 4 October for the first time since 20 September. The troop was observed in the vicinity of the pig farm before moving towards the farm at the pigs feeding time.
- The troop was most frequently encoutered in the vicinity of the pig farm, often coinciding with the delivery of food for the animals.
- On 20 October there was a hotline call regarding two dogs chasing approximately 15 baboons on the mountain slope above Owl Rock Estate.

HAMILTON RUSSELL

- The Hamilton Russell Troop was diretly observed on just one day during October.
- On 2 October two unidentified baboons crossed the Heme-en-Aarde Road near Volmoed. Later on the same day the troop was observed in the Volmoed Valley area.

VIRTUAL FENCE

- The virtual fence was used on nine days during October.
- Activations were used to deter the Voëlklip Troop (n = 5), Onrus Troop (n = 3), and Vogelgat Troop (n = 1).

GENERAL COMMENTS

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

Two births and one death were recorded in the Voëlklip Troop. Both the Blue Tag and Green tag females were observed carrying newborn infants on 3 and 6 October respectively. Unfortunately, VKF1 AKA Green Tag Female was observed carrying her deceased infant on 8 October. While not directly observed, it is thought that the infant was killed by VKM6U whilst he was chasing the females during a bout of intra-troop conflict. No other demographic changes were recorded for the managed troops in the Eastern Overstrand during the month.

HOTLINE DATA

A total of 53 hotline calls were received during October, significantly more than received during September (16). Most of the hotline calls were concerning the Voëlklip Troop (n = 34), followed by the Vogelgat (n = 16) and Onrus Troops (n = 2). Only one call was received from an unmanaged area, Pringle Bay. The majority of calls reported baboon locations in the urban area (n = 24). A total of eleven calls were made reporting incursion behaviour, with six reporting occupied house incursions and four reporting bin raiding behaviour. Thirteen comments were received from residents of Fernkloof village reporting their concern about the behaviour of the lone Vogelgat male baboon. One call was made to report threatening behaviour by VKM7.

RECORDED INCURSIONS

A total of 39 incursions were recorded during October, more than double the number of incursions recorded during the previous month (n = 15). The majority of these incursions were baboon entries into the urban area (n = 23). Notably, the number of bin raids were double that during the previous month (n = 10). Several assertive incursions, namely occupied (n = 2) and unoccupied house raids (n = 3), were also recorded.




Figure 5. Graph showing incursion behaviour of managed troops in the eastern Overstrand in October 2024.

PERCENTAGE TIME OUT OF TOWN

The average time spent out of town by troops in the eastern Overstrand during October remained at 100%. However, individual time out of town decreased from 99.7% to 97.5%. This decrease is largely attributed to the members of the Voëlklip Troop, which spent approximately 16.5 hours in town, and the lone Vogelgat male, which spent approximately 19.5 in town. In total, individuals from these two troops spent a total of 36 hours and 39 minutes in the urban area during October.




Figure 6. Percentage time the managed baboon troops and individuals spent out of town during October 2024.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Waste and recycling collection should be prioritized to take place in the early mornings and starting on the edge of town and working inwards.
- Residents should **not** put out their waste **the night before** collection day because this may encourage baboons to raid that evening or early the next morning.
- Refuse bags should never be left lying open on the sidewalk and easily available to baboons.
- All bins used in baboon effected areas should be baboon-proof and locked.
- Open vegetable gardens should be baboon proofed. This includes secure compost bins or containers.
- Ripening fruits should be removed from fruiting trees.
- Residents are strongly discouraged from feeding wildlife, including birds. Bird seed is a powerful attractant for baboons.
- Residents are encouraged to record and report the feeding of wildlife to the municipality, CapeNature, or to the baboon hotline (072 028 0008).
- Dogs should always be on a leash when walking in an area where baboons may be present. This is mandatory in the Fernkloof Nature Reserve.

CONCLUSION

Overall, the behaviour of managed baboon troops in the Eastern Overstrand declined when compared to the previous month. Whilst all troops remained absent from town, individuals from the Voëlklip and Vogelgat Troops spent a combined 36 hours and 39 minutes in town. This resulted in 10 bin raids, three unoccupied house incursions, and two occupied house incursions. The majority of these incursions can be attributed to members of the Voëlklip Troop, in particular VKM7.

Highly assertive behaviour has become a recent trend in the behaviour of VKM7. Since July 2024, VKM7 has been responsible for four occupied house incursions, and two unoccupied house incursions. Moreover, a hotline call was received on 31 October reporting him acting in a threatening manner to a resident in Fernkloof. Whilst this is not comparable to the extreme behaviour of the more habituated baboons in the western areas of the Overstrand, it does show a significant deterioration in behaviour. The potentially dispersing male in the Vogelgat Troop has also shown a disturbing trend towards assertive raids. It is vital that this elevation in assertive incursions into houses is closely monitored and reported.
